# **March on Invasives**

With planting season right around the corner it's essential that when we're choosing plants for our gardens, we make informed decisions. Many of the plants offered at Garden centers can be aggressive and invasive when they escape our small city gardens, crowding out our native plants that are crucial to wildlife. Here's a list of 3 common non-natives and a native substitute:

#### 1. Invasive: Japanese Honeysuckle

Japanese Honeysuckle can be beautiful, but grows quickly and spreads like crazy quickly shading the forest floor in spring. Japanese Honeysuckle also poisons the soil around it's drip line killing or greatly weakening other plants. And don't let the name fool you —that famous Honeysuckle scent is non-existent with this 1800's import. This is one of the most common invasives that we see in Windsor Park.

#### **Alternative: Dogwood (Shrub)**

The Dogwood is a great alternative to the Japanese Honeysuckle and it tolerates wet shady places. It provides seasonal interest all year long: In the Winter it's stems are bright green or red depending on the variety. In the Spring the Dogwood is loaded with compact clusters of white flowers that the bees love and later berries that attract songbirds to your yard. It leaves provide great texture in the garden for Summer. And in the fall the leaves turn a showy display for yellow and orange.

#### 2. Invasive: Winged Burning Bush

Originally intended as an ornamental because of it's fire-colored fall foliage, this plant's invasive qualities became very apparent, very quickly. Producing hundreds of berries per plant, it travels after being eaten by birds and other wildlife. Once outside of our gardens it takes over the forest landscape forming DENSE thickets that native plants cannot penetrate. To make matters worse this plant is still being sold in garden centers.

#### **Alternative: Chokeberry (Shrub)**

In terms of an alternative you can't really go wrong with a Chokeberry. It's a near mirror of the Winged Burning Bush in terms of visual interest to your

garden. During the autumn it changes to a fiery display of red and orange. In the spring it's covered with white and pink flowers and then as an added benefit it produces edible berries. The berry contain high levels of anti-oxidants and vitamins A, C, E and K.

#### 3. Invasive: Chinese Wisteria

Let's just start off and say: Chinese Wisteria is gorgeous. It's long clusters of purple of flowers sway effortlessly in the breeze, twining vine wrap charmingly around trellises and up the sides of homes and the scent? To die for. But don't let the fairytale appearance fool you, all parts of the plant are actually poisonous, oozing a toxin called wisterin. To make matters worse it's incredibly destructive, the Wisteria vine relies on it's support and as the vine ages and get heavier it often ends up crushing it's support with it's weight, that could mean your trellis, other trees, ... and even your house. It grows by seed and rooted bits that you've cut off the plant in an attempt to control it. Most infestations will occur near the plant itself.

#### **Alternative: American Wisteria**


While the Chinese and Japanese version of Wisteria are considered invasive in Windsor Park's gardens. American Wisteria is a native, non-invasive choice. But prepare yourself: The blooms aren't as showy, they're more compact (think pinecone) and Wisteria's famed scent isn't as strong on this side of the Pacific. American Wisteria establishes itself easier needing less water and care and can handle shade a bit better in your garden. And while still plenty aggressive in your garden it's much easier to control.

But sometimes there is always that one plant that we just can't resist growing, be smart and responsible when growing an invasive. For example if it grows by sending out runners, maybe grow it in a pot. Or if it's an ardent seeder, make sure you collect the blooms after it's finished flowering. Do your research on plants before bring them home. and ultimately have fun.

# **Construction on Brookside**

The trees planted last year along the Pogues Run Trail, by IPL and Keep Indianapolis Beautiful, were removed last week in anticipation of a large drainage and repaving project. KIBI is holding the trees at their headquarters, trying to save them and hope to replant them along the trail this summer.

This spring, DPW and Citizens Energy are working on a project intended to address the ongoing drainage and flooding issues along Brookside from 10th Street to Newman. This project will disrupt residents and businesses at the west end of the neighborhood and has raised some questions and concerns. Mark Zwoyer, PE, Administrator- Engineering Design, Department of Public Works has been answering questions about the project. We are sharing a summary of Mr. Zwoyer's answers here:


Timeline. Four to five months. The project has an anticipated completion date of July 31, 2018 and the City has liquidated damages as a part of the contract, which should help keep the project on track.

Scope of Work. Citizen's Energy Group is adding 700 lineal feet of trench drain and several new storm water inlets along the east side of Brookside. The road will be ground and repayed to slope towards the new drains.

Benefits and Limitations of the Project. The new drains should capture most of the water that currently runs down Brookside and into the CCIC bays and also the water that runs down Arsenal from Brookside. This project will not eliminate water infiltrating the CCIC bays that sit lower than the street nor will it resolve the ponding water at the south east corner of Arsenal and Brookside. Street Closures and Access. Businesses and residents will have restricted access. 11th Street, 12th Street and Arsenal will be closed to Brookside. Brookside will be closed to through traffic but the contractor will maintain local access and all drives and docks will remain accessible. 11th Street between Brookside and Arsenal will be contraflow traffic for local access, only. Parking and access for neighbors north of Arsenal along Brookside will be coordinated by the Contractor during construction. There will be clear signed detour routes. Trail access will be impacted periodically. Sidewalks will be similarly impacted.



Fletcher Park and Large Tree Protection. Disruption is not anticipated beyond the curb line and they do not anticipate cutting into the trail. As such, DPW does not anticipate the need for protective or restorative work. If that changes, DPW will direct the Contractor to take appropriate action. (WPNA has requested park and tree protection if that happens). DPW will share our desire to meet with the contractor on site prior to work commencing.

This plan is credited with helping Cottage Home become what it is today. The WP plan could look like this or not.




#### **CONSERVATION VS. HISTORIC**
